History and Origin

Cosscutenongsebee: the name the Potawatomi used for the Huron River, meaning "burnt river district."

Giwitatiqueiasibi: the Ojibwa name for the Huron River, it means the same as the above Potawatomi word. The ending on both words, 'sibi' and 'sebee,' as well as the 'sippi' ending on Mississippi, means river or stream.

Washtenaw: a modification of a compound Ojibwa word "Wustenong" or "Washte'nong" meaning the 'farther district,' 'further country,' and 'land beyond.' "Wushte" means further or beyond, while "nong" means district or land.
